ABERDEEN EARMARKED FOR SCAA'S SECOND LIFE-SAVING HELICOPTER



Aberdeen has been unveiled as the location for SCAA's promised second charity-funded helicopter air ambulance, with hopes of launching the service by late 2019.

The proposed Aberdeen-based aircraft callsign Helimed 79 - will join its stablemate Helimed 76 already operating out of Perth Airport.

The strengthened SCAA fleet will effectively double the number of helicopter air ambulances operating in Scotland, working alongside the two Government funded helicopters based at Glasgow and Inverness.

This expansion of the airborne emergency pre-hospital care fleet will increase the response capability to time-critical medical and trauma emergencies, retrievals and urgent transfers across the whole of Scotland - also supported

by two Government-funded fixed-wing patient transfer aircraft.

The decision to locate its second helicopter at Aberdeen comes after lengthy talks between SCAA and the Scottish Ambulance Service. in consultation with other key stakeholders.

SCAA founding Chairman John Bullough explained that the board unanimously approved Aberdeen as the base for the new aircraft following a recommendation from the Scottish Ambulance Service.

"Aberdeen houses one of Scotland's four Major Trauma Centres in the Scottish Trauma Network and it makes sense for Helimed 79 to add its considerable capability to that growing hub of emergency medical resources," said Mr Bullough.

"SCAA is frequently tasked to emergencies in the north east and having an air ambulance based there will optimise the coverage and resilience of the country's entire emergency air response – helping to fulfil one of the Scottish Trauma Network's key objectives of transporting patients to a key trauma centre such as Aberdeen within 45 minutes of serious illness or injury.

"With a second helicopter air ambulance service, SCAA will further positively impact on the outcome for patients – ultimately saving and improving hundreds more lives every year.

"The fact that SCAA is looking to launch a second aircraft after only five years is a testament to the level of support and public engagement that we have received nationally," added Mr Bullough. "SCAA is entirely funded by charitable donations and the people of Scotland have funded each and every one of our nearly 2,000 emergency responses to every corner of the country."

Plans to expand to Aberdeen have also received Government backing with Cabinet Secretary for Health and Sport Jeane Freeman saying a second SCAA helicopter will "make a huge difference".

"It is crucial that we ensure the most severely injured patients have the best chance of a speedy recovery from their injuries.

"Recently, I had the honour of opening Scotland's first Major Trauma Centre in Aberdeen which will treat the most seriously injured patients in the North of Scotland. This second air ambulance will build capacity



to support this, significantly contributing to our growing hub of resources in that area."

The Scottish Ambulance Service has also praised the proposal with Chairman Tom Steele describing it as wonderful news, not only for Grampian and the North-east, but for the whole of Scotland.

"SCAA has been a very important partner since 2013 when they provided their first helicopter air ambulance, based in Perth," he said. "Since then it has flown almost 2000 emergency missions and undoubtedly has saved many lives across Scotland's rural and remote areas.

"The second SCAA helicopter will be based in Aberdeen and like the Perth helicopter, its deployment will be integrated with our own emergency response air ambulance fleet. This will add very significant capability bringing fast medical care to very unwell patients as well as quick life-saving transport to hospital if required.

"We are very grateful to SCAA for their massive fund-raising effort and to the Scottish public for their generous support."

SCAA Chief Executive David Craig explained that having unveiled where its second aircraft will be best located to complement the existing helicopter air ambulances, the charity will now focus attention on the infrastructure required to set up a new base.

"SCAA will work with its service partners to determine where exactly that operational airbase should be located in the city area, along with the process of recruiting crew, and begin to establish the station." he said.

"The charity is currently in talks with existing and potential major donors to help us secure the £6 million required to launch and sustain a second helicopter for its first three years," he said, "with a view to going operational as soon as financially viable – hopefully by late 2019."

ADRIENNE'S STORY

A walk in the hills took a dramatic turn for Adrienne when a simple slide rendered her completely immobile - and miles from anywhere.



My foot slipped on the wet grass and I heard this horrendous crack," she recalled. "I crumpled to the ground in agony, knowing I had broken something."

What Adrienne didn't know was that her ankle had snapped and had turned through 180 degrees, leaving her lying helpless with a limb-threatening injury more than 1,500ft up the West Lomond Hills.

Luckily, hair stylist Adrienne from Larbert was walking with her partner Davie and two friends at the time and they immediately called 999.

The emergency services then activated a tracker on Davie's phone to locate the accident scene.

As they comforted Adrienne and tried to keep her warm, the group was relieved to learn a Mountain Rescue Team had been called in but knew they faced a hazardous stretcher carry down the rugged hillside.

"Then we heard an air ambulance had been called," said Adrienne. "By this stage I was cold and a little in shock but still calm and comforted by the fact that help was on its way.

'It didn't seem long before I heard the helicopter approach and I remember thinking - everything will be OK now."

Content there were now enough people on scene to move Adrienne, the emergency services stood down the Mountain Rescue Team as SCAA landed on a flat area above the group and paramedics immediately swung into action.

"One look told us we were dealing with a serious break," explained SCAA Lead Paramedic John Pritchard. "One that could prove limb threatening if left untreated for too long."

SCAA then set up a temporary "bothy" shelter to protect Adrienne and the paramedics from the elements.

After administering strong painkiller, paramedics realigned Adrienne's foot to restore blood flow and splinted the joint before she was carried by crew, friends and passers-by to the waiting aircraft further up the hillside.

"The paramedics were amazing," said Adrienne. "So calm and professional. They explained everything they were doing to me in detail to keep me reassured and comforted.

"They told me it would hurt so I just kept breathing in the Entenox and I was fine while they worked on my ankle."

Adrienne was flown to Ninewells Hospital at Dundee within minutes where she spent two days undergoing an operation to reset her ankle.

She had no sooner recovered than she was striding out again - this time with some friends to raise funds for SCAA, securing nearly £4,000 on her sponsored canal walk.

Reflecting on the day of her accident. Adrienne is full of praise for the charity team that flew to her aid.

"I honestly don't know what I would have done without SCAA that day," she said. "The charity provides a vital service in Scotland and I can't thank them enough for what they did for me."

SCAA PILOT JOINS THE TOP FLIGHT IN NATIONAL AWARDS



Pilot Of The Year

One of SCAA's regular pilots, Captain Gavin Rowley, has lifted the Pilot Of The Year Award at the recent national Association of Air Ambulances' Awards of Excellence 2018 which recognise and reward outstanding achievements within the UK's air ambulance community.

The prestigious award recognised a challenging mission Gavin flew through the treacherous cloud shrouded mountains and glens of Scotland earlier this year to reach a heart attack victim in remote Glen Kinglass.

Gavin's citation for the Awards read in summary:

"There is no doubt in Scotland's Charity Air Ambulance's mind that the exceptional skills, experience and knowledge displayed by

Captain Gavin Rowley played a crucial role in saving the life of the patient that day.

"Not only did he use his impressive flying skills to adapt and accord with each new changing and challenging situation, but he also refused to give up when the need was there to reach a seriously ill patient at one of Scotland's most remote and inaccessible locations and in such horrendous weather conditions.

"Never compromising aircraft or crew safety, Captain Rowley deployed his extensive knowledge of both the aircraft's technology and capability - and the challenging unique landscape - to quickly change the format of the operation as circumstances dictated.

"On a demanding flight that would have tested the mettle of most, Captain Rowley assessed each situation and took the safe, legal and effective option to fulfil the mission and successfully airlift the patient to critical hospital care, thereby saving his life."

Accepting his award from TV personalities Richard Madeley and Angelica Bell – and Nick Earl. CEO of category sponsor Safran UK - a delighted Gavin said:

"In the past few years Scotland's Charity Air Ambulance has continually secured the necessary equipment and people to deliver its first-class air ambulance service in Scotland.

"While being awarded the 'Pilot Of The Year 2018' is a very great honour. I could only achieve that recognition through my small part of the operation because of all the support and work from the whole team at SCAA - from paramedics to fundraisers (both staff and volunteers).

"I was extremely proud to receive OUR award for everyone involved at SCAA."
